Characters of: CHANGEUP

Charlie.....former baseball coach 60-75

Ellen.....Charlie's daughter 35-45

A daughter helps her elderly father deal with life.

Open in BLACK to the sounds of children playing baseball and the accompnying CHATTER "At a baby, at a baby, Good pick, way to go. Way to hustle." LIGHTS inch up to reveal CHARLIE, an elderly man, sitting alone on a splintered, wooden bench. As Lights reach full O/S SOUND fades and Charlie, in a monotone, quietly takes up the chatter.

CHARLIE

Atta baby, atta baby. Way to go. Good hustle. Way to pick it.

(long pause, then he places the back of his left hand flat on the ground)

Bend your knees. Crouch down and bend your knees. Get low. Keep your glove on the ground.

(pause)

That's it. That's it, you've got it. Charge the ball now...charge it...

(sits quietly for several beats)

ELLEN (O.S.)

Dad...dad?

CHARLIE

Around the horn. Bring it home. Good hustle, now let's get two.

ELLEN

(entering)

Thank god, there you are.

CHARLIE

Oh, hi Ellen.

ELLEN

Where have you been. I've been looking all over for you.

CHARLIE

I'm right here.

I've been calling and calling. Why haven't you answered your phone?

CHARLIE

My phones at home.

ELLEN

You're supposed to keep it with you.

CHARLIE

No, no I keep it on the coffee table.

ELLEN

It's not going to you any good at home. You need to keep it with you. You know, for emergencies.

CHARLIE

I keep on the table. The coffee table. It's always right there in the middle of the table, Ellen. That's how I know where it's at. So I don't lose it.

ELLEN

That's fine, I don't want you to lose it, but do me a favor.

CHARLIE

Sure honey.

ELLEN

Keep it in your pocket.

CHARLIE

What?

ELLEN

Your phone.

CHARLIE

Not on the coffee table?

ELLEN

Right. Not on the table.

CHARLIE

O.K.

If it's in your pocket, I'll always be able to get ahold of you.

CHARLIE

And I'll have it for emergencies.

ELLEN

There you go, "you'll have it for emergencies."

CHARLIE

Good idea.

ELLEN

Thought I'd never find you. What are you doing over here at the school?

CHARLIE

Your mom went shopping so I decided to come over and watch the boys play ball.

ELLEN

Dad...mom's not here anymore.

CHARLIE

I know honey, she's shopping.

ELLEN

She's not shopping.

CHARLIE

She's not?

ELLEN

No, she's not.

CHARLIE

Well, where is she?

ELLEN

She died five years ago. Don't you remember?

CHARLIE

Five years?

ELLEN

We talked about this before. The funeral...

CHARLIE

The funeral?

Yes, the funeral. Remember?

CHARLIE

Sure I remember the funeral. There were a lot of flowers. Real nice flowers.

ELLEN

That's right. There were a lot of real nice flowers at moms funeral. That's why we had the services, because mom died.

CHARLIE

No, I don't think so. I love your mom, Ellen. She's just shopping. She loves to go shopping.

ELLEN

We've been through this...

CHARLIE

Probably at the mall.

ELLEN

Sure... O.K.

(pause)

Y'know, you had me worried. I didn't know where you were, but then I remembered how I found you at this school the last time you went missing.

CHARLIE

I like to watch the kids play ball.

ELLEN

There's no one here.

CHARLIE

Oh, sure there is.

(stands and looks out)

Can't you hear them chatter?

(he chatters)

"that a way, that a way to bring it. Come baby, hum baby."

ELLEN

You haven't coached the boys at this school in 20 years.

CHARLIE

Your mom used to keep score.

You were a good coach.

CHARLIE

She was a good score keeper.

ELLEN

Yes, she was.

CHARLIE

They're good ball players, these kids.

ELLEN

I'm sure they were.

CHARLIE

Know what I miss...that I really
love?

ELLEN

What?

CHARLIE

Hitting infield. I miss that.

ELLEN

Yeah, well you did it for a long time.

CHARLIE

I did.

ELLEN

Why this school? You coached at a lot of different places...

CHARLIE

Five or six.

ELLEN

So, why this school? Why come back here?

CHARLIE

Hal Wallis.

ELLEN

Hal Wallis?

CHARLIE

Yup.

What on earth are you talking about?

CHARLIE

Know who he is?

ELLEN

Hal Wallis?

CHARLIE

Or who he was?

ELLEN

I think he had something to do with the movies...producer, director, something like that.

CHARLIE

Producer, he produced "Casablanca."

ELLEN

That was a good movie.

CHARLIE

It was.

ELLEN

Humphrey Bogart and Ingrid Bergman.

CHARLIE

He brought Elvis to Hollywood and produced most of his movies.

ELLEN

I'm surprised you know this.

CHARLIE

Honey, I may have problems with my memory, but I'm not dumb. Just have...you know, like holes in it.

ELLEN

I know.

CHARLIE

Anyway, this was his home. I looked up a lot of it on that Google thing you showed me how to use.

ELLEN

That's great. I'm glad you're using your computer. It's not really that hard.

CHARLIE

I finally got it. Took me awhile though. I kept on getting that other thing.

ELLEN

What other thing?

CHARLIE

That other thing with the goofy name.

ELLEN

"Goofy thing?"

CHARLIE

With all the restaurant reviews.

ELLEN

Yelp?

CHARLIE

Yeah, that one. I kept getting Yelped.

ELLEN

(laughing)

You got "yelped." That's funny, Dad.

CHARLIE

Those people are crazy. They give "Denny's" five stars.

ELLEN

(laughs)

It's just their opinion. What did you find on the internet?

CHARLIE

A lot. Wallis bought this old Spanish rancho in the twenties or thirties and remodeled the ranch house.

ELLEN

How did it become a school?

CHARLIE

The city took it.

ELLEN

Took it?

CHARLIE

Well, yeah...y'know, that thing they do.

ELLEN

Eminent domain?

CHARLIE

Yeah honey, that's it, "eminent domain". They took it from him and built the school.

ELLEN

How 'bout that?

(pause)

So that's why you come back here...Hal Wallis?

CHARLIE

No.

ELLEN

Why?

CHARLIE

The kids. The ball field.

(pause)

This is a good field. A good team...and

(pause)

And...and...

ELLEN

And what, Dad?

CHARLIE

And this is where I found my "Flying Eagle."

ELLEN

So tell me, what's a "Flying Eagle?"

CHARLIE

1858, One Cent coin.

ELLEN

That's old.

CHARLIE

It is. Found it right out there by home plate when I was hitting infield. Catcher kicked it up when he was fielding a bunt.

Pretty good find.

CHARLIE

Somebody dropped it in the eighteen hundreds and I found it a hundred and some years latter (pause)

Right after I dropped your mother off to go shopping.

ELLEN

1858...long time ago.

CHARLIE

Dropped her off and came here to practice with the boys. Came to hit infield to the team. I loved to hit infield.

(pause)

I loved your mom.

He is lost in reverie

CHARLIE

(continuing)

She's just shopping.

ELLEN

Dad...

CHARLIE

She loved to go shopping...

ELLEN

Hey Dad.

CHARLIE

...huh...

ELLEN

Think you can still hit infield?

Coming out of it.

CHARLIE

Sure, I can hit infield

ELLEN

Whose the Shortstop on this team?

CHARLIE

"Scoots", Scoots DeJoie. That kid can really "pick it."

Running down stage.

ELLEN

I'll be Scoots.

Takes up a fielding position.

ELLEN (CONT.)

Come on hit me some, Coach.

CHARLIE

Okay...okay, Scoots. Let's get one. The plays at First.

Mimes hitting a grounder.

CHARLIE (CONT.)

Way to pick it, way to pick it. Atta boy.

Mimes catching ball, throwing it up and hitting another grounder. As LIGHTS START TO FADE.

CHARLIE (CONT.)

(continuing)

Okay let's shoot two guys...

Continue to FADE THE LIGHTS to Black and bring up O/S Chatter:

O/S CHATTER "Atta baby, atta baby, good pick, way to go, way to go."
